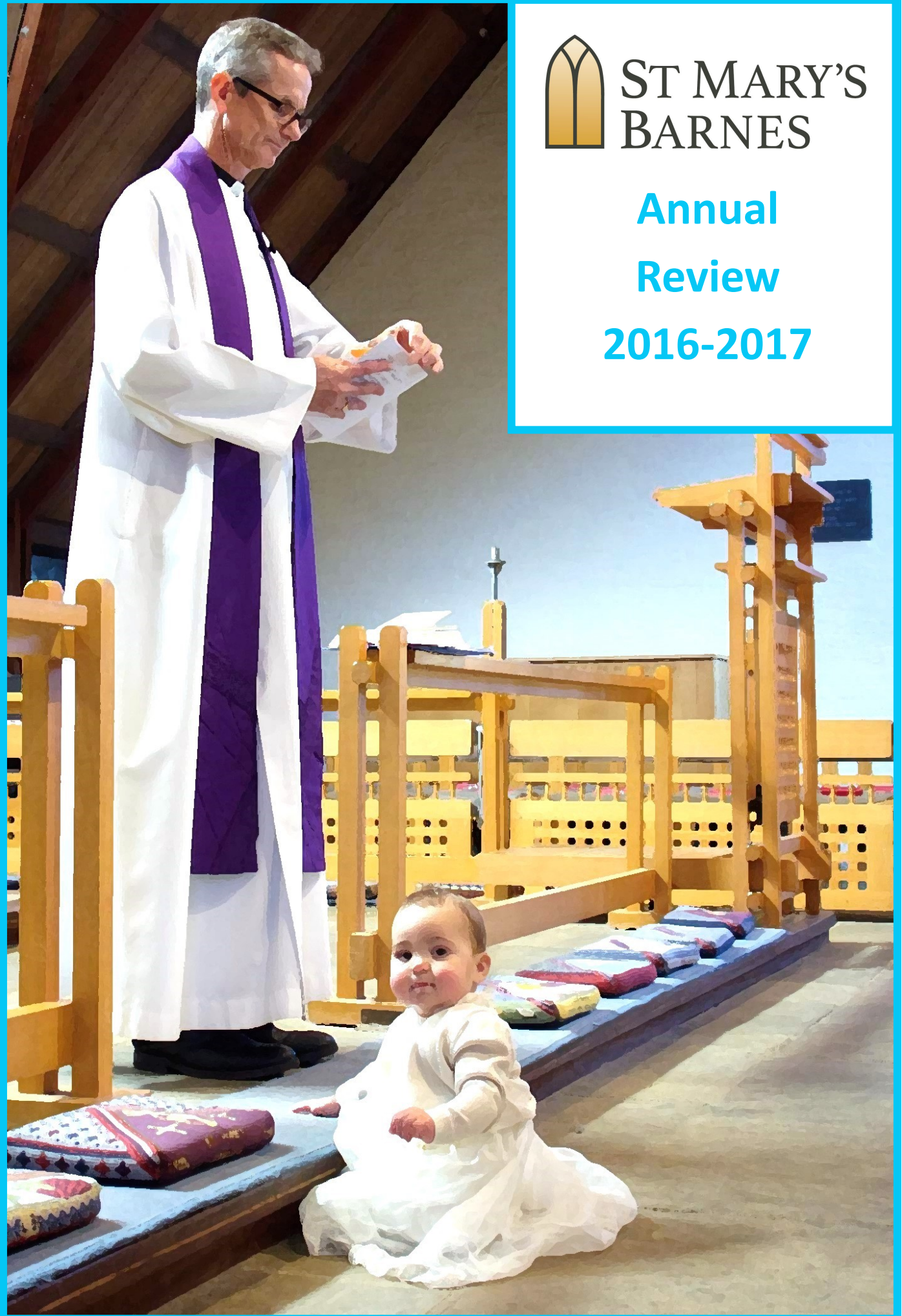
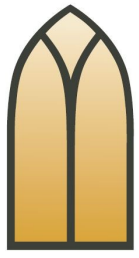

Churchwardens' Report

After a year dominated by marking the 800th anniversary, this has been a more reflective year. The perceived need was to have a period of reflection and calm with an emphasis on individual vocation and spiritual growth.

We have said a reluctant farewell to our team curate the Revd Ann Lynes. The affection in which Ann was held was demonstrated over the summer by the warmth of the congregational response to the Thanksgiving Service for the civil partnership entered into between Ann and Sigrun Wagner. It was shown again by the numbers from St Mary's who attended Ann's Institution and Induction service at Holy Trinity Northwood on 27th February.

Ann's departure undoubtedly leaves a gap. It is inevitable that a heavier burden will fall on our Rector Richard. He is we know grateful for the support he receives from Bishop Richard and our lay readers Geoffrey and Christabel. It is important that our clergy receive all our support and appreciation. We are blessed with the variety and richness of the ministry they provide. We are pleased also to welcome Martin Calderbank who is based at St Mary's whilst training to be ordained.

With the assistance of Peter Siddall, the PCC has been reviewing the St Mary's Mission Action Plan. The aim has been not to carry out a complete review starting from scratch but to look at each of our core areas, worship, learning, pastoral care, outreach and hospitality, to see if and where there are gaps. The PCC has identified communications as an area that needs to be developed. The PCC are the trustees and watchdogs of our church and we are extremely grateful to all those who have given of their time and talents over the year to serve in this important voluntary leadership role. We thank all the members of the PCC for another year of great service at St Mary's.

On the financial side, a new Financial Review Group has met around once a quarter to take a broader look at the way the church finances are organised. The group has helped the PCC to carry out a review of our reserves policy. We continue to be grateful to our Treasurer Patrick Findlater for the prompt and efficient way in which

he monitors and records the church finances.

After five and a half years, Daniel Turner relinquished his role as Director of Music going out in a blaze of musical glory at our annual carol service. Dan's contribution to the music at St Mary's has been hugely appreciated by everyone.

The senior and junior choirs both excelled under Dan's leadership and Dan's singing and musicianship very greatly enhanced our worship together. Peter Boyling and Judy Gowing have played important roles in the organisation of all aspects of the music in church since Dan's departure.

We are very pleased that the position of our youth and childrens' worker, Charlie Auton, has been secured into a third year. The range of groups and activities for under 16s has continued to be a feature of our worship.

Cheryl Cole, our church administrator, has continued to run the office with humour and efficiency as well as to take charge of the hirings of Kitson Hall. We are most grateful to her for all her work.

On fabric, we cannot resist mentioning the recently installed new lighting system. A large amount of work was put into the project by Paul Traynor, the lighting designer, and by Phil Bladen, who took the lead on this project on behalf of the Fabric Committee.

After three years in post, Patty will be stepping down this April. We have so much enjoyed working together as a team and with our Rector Richard.

Barnes Team Ministry

The three Church of England churches in Barnes are legally joined as a Team Ministry. While we keep our own PCCs, finances and distinct ethos, the team structure gives us all, clergy and laity, extra strength for our mission and ministry from receiving and giving mutual support.

The membership of the Team Council includes the Team clergy, Readers and churchwardens with two elected lay members from each church.

The three churches bring different but complementary styles of churchmanship and each church can learn from each other's gifts. The team council seeks to develop the relationships between the churches, with opportunities to share in worship, and joint activities. One such activity is the Foodbank based in the Castelneau Centre, which continues to meet the needs of those who call on it. It was established by Holy Trinity who run it; and the other churches provide support to the project.

Another is the Team Prayer walk round Barnes: one for children had been enjoyed by those who attended, and a second adult walk is being planned for May.

In January, our team curate, Revd Ann Lynes, moved away to be licensed as vicar of Holy Trinity Northwood. In leaving she encouraged us to visit each other more frequently and learn from each other. She suggested more social events designed to mix up members of the congregations. Members of the churches thanked Ann warmly for her time with us, saying that she would be remembered for sharing her gifts, and the joy that she had brought to Barnes.

During the year the churches exchanged information about developments in their churches. Among the highlights Holy Trinity reported a growing congregation and their introduction of two Sunday morning services, as well as more courses and home groups, to respond to the greater numbers. St Michael's are developing their church's strategy under their new vicar Father Stephen. Both churches are working hard to replace their church halls.

The finalized annual accounts of the Team for 2016 are available. The main costs are maintenance of the curate's house, 52 Boileau Rd and our curate's expenses. The reserve, from past income from rental of the house, should be more than sufficient to cover costs into next year, though the house will now be rented out for a period and income will therefore be received.

Regular BYG nights take place once a month on a Sunday evening in Kitson Hall for young people of secondary school age. This year these sessions will be interspersed with filming and outings to off-site activities such as trampoline and climbing parks. It promises to be another action-packed year ahead! Every year our young people have supported 'Under Tree Schools' (UTS) in South Sudan. Our young people have raised much needed funds for UTS by running a stall at the Barnes Fair, ringing hand bells during the Barnes Christmas Festival and managing an Advent challenge for the St Mary's congregation. This year, the Advent challenge alone raised a staggering **£280.25**.

BYG simply could not run without the fantastic support of committed volunteers. I am privileged to be supported by David Summers, Jo Fraser and Nick Hartley. They have each been a great blessing to myself and the young people.

I would like to keep raising the bar on the provision of opportunities for young people at St Mary's. It is vitally important that they have access to a group which develops their Christian faith, particularly in an increasingly uncertain world. Bellringing at St Mary's

Another very busy year in the bell tower! The bells have been rung for the 10am service every Sunday, with one exception when we were in Evesham on our summer trip in July. In addition, we have rung for many special events, including the 90th birthday of HM Queen Elizabeth, to celebrate 20 years of ringing by three members of the band, Trisha Hawkins, Andrew Howard Smith and Giles Dimock as well as for Ann Lynes' last Sunday in January. We were pleased to be invited to ring for the Music Festival's 'Georgian London' concert and to be ringing on our three oldest bells which would have been rung throughout the Georgian era!

We have seen a huge increase in the number of those coming to learn. One week there were 28 ringers in the tower for our additional Saturday beginners' practice! The Coffee Shop refreshments are a huge bonus. Numbers include nine new ringers ranging in age from 10 years upwards, some of whom we are teaching for our neighbouring towers. Sigrun Wagner learned to ring before she and Ann left for Northwood. The adoption of the Association of Ringing Teachers' training methods has seemed to mark a turning point. Our plans to purchase and install two dumb bells for training purposes will become more important as the number of trainees and recruits increases.

The band, with some supporting local ringers, visited a number of towers during the year. We went to 33 towers on the summer trip centred on Evesham, joined practices at Richmond, Battersea and Chiswick during the break in our own Saturday practices during August and in January 2017 visited another six towers in the area between Sandhurst and Basingstoke.

We hosted the Association of Ringing Teachers' (ART) Module 2 course at St Mary's in April and then in January the Surrey Association of Church Bell Ringers' Northern District meeting.

This year we had a total of ten different designs, some dating back many years, which I inherited when I took over the cards two and a half years ago.

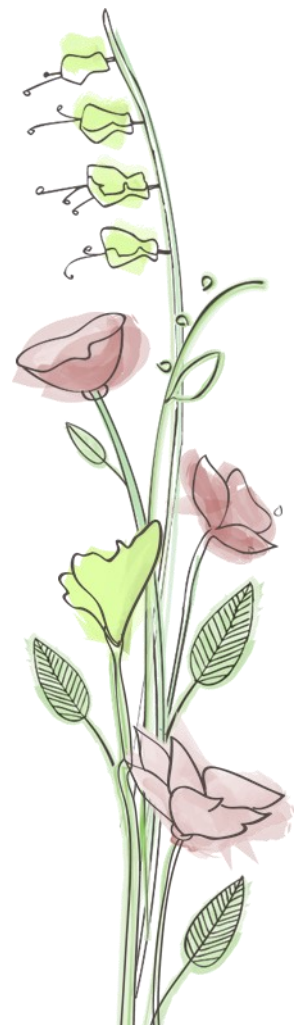
We had plenty of stock of last year's cards, the lovely painting by Helen Pettigrew of the Canada Geese on Barnes Pond and the wreaths with the blue background. We had four new designs this year: Helen Pettigrew's Nativity scene, and the three kneelers photographed by Paul Phillips. They were all A6 size, because feedback told us that smaller cards are more popular.

We sold 778 packs of cards across all the designs, but the most popular were the Canada Geese on Barnes Pond, the Advent wreaths and Henderson's picture of the church. In terms of profit, we made a total of £1,885.54 and this goes towards the charities St Mary's supports.

It is clear to me that the sale of Christmas cards is diminishing. The cost of postage is a barrier to some of our customers buying and sending cards. The younger generation will probably never send cards in the way that older generations do now. But for now we keep on going. I am very grateful to the wonderful team of volunteers that enabled us to keep the church open for the sale of cards throughout December. Rev'd Richard also said how grateful he is to the team volunteer postmen and women who provide cut price deliveries!

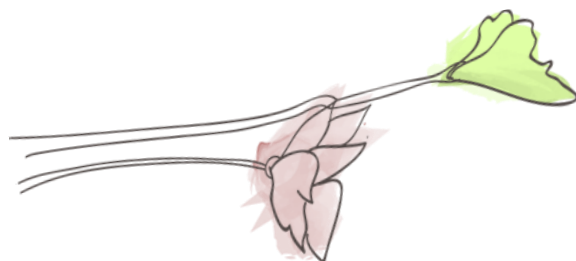

Deepening Faith

One of the five key areas in our strategy Today & Tomorrow is Learning. In this we commit ourselves to be a learning church in which people have the opportunity to grow in their understanding of faith and what it means to be a Christian. There are several ways in which we do this:

A Rough Guide to Christianity – is a discussion group for adults that is an introduction to Christian belief and practice. Adults who have not been confirmed and would like to receive communion join this group. We were delighted that five adults were confirmed this year in services at the Cathedral.

Welcome into Communion Group – for children of seven years and up in which they explore ideas of faith and what the Eucharist means. It culminates in a special service where they receive communion for the first time. This year 6 children received communion for the first time.

Home Study Group—During the last year we have begun to get some understanding of Julian of Norwich, introduced by Shelagh Mitchell who is well versed in her. We have also studied the Beatitudes. In Advent we dipped into and had much discussion of Mark Oakley’s *The Splash of Words*, subtitled *Believing in Poetry*. He offers profound and illuminating commentary on thirty very varied poems. In Lent we examined and discussed a chapter a week of Rowan Williams’ *God with Us*, the meaning of the cross and resurrection, then and now. We meet on Thursday mornings and have very varied discussion on whatever we may have just read. If anyone feels like coming one Thursday do let Fiona Barnett know.

Exploring the Way Group—Two home groups, one convened by Christabel Gairdner and Lucy Hine, the other by Fouki Heller and Judica Palmarozza, have been studying the Gospel of John and the Letters of John over the past year, which ended with the two groups coming together for a study morning on John's Gospel given by Allen Dixon. Facilitating the evenings is shared within the groups, which meet independently on Tuesday evenings for three six-week blocks over the year. New members are always welcome. We study, share and pray together but above all we listen and learn from one another. Everyone has contributed either by hosting or leading the groups - and of course participating - and the evenings continue to be congenial and rewarding.

Lent Talks – these take place every year on a different theme and in various churches of Barnes. This year the theme was “Kingdom Matters” and it focused on social issues which are of deep concern in our world today: poverty, homelessness, religious persecution, refugees and the care of prisoners. Speakers had frontline experience of working in these fields and gave us their very personal perspectives.

Deepening Faith (cont'd)

Advent Prayer Workshops – these have become a regular and valuable feature of our calendar. Advent was enriched by a weekly quiet time of contemplation with a special focus on St Teresa of Avila, St Augustine of Hippo, Mother Julian of Norwich and the Silence Within.

Pilgrimage – following our first Parish Pilgrimage in 2015 we embarked on another one, this time a walk to St Paul's Cathedral (our Patron Church). On a glorious summer's day 16 of us walked the ten miles to St Paul's. When we arrived we were given a guided tour by Canon Michael Hampel. This was followed by Choral Evensong. The whole day was a wonderful experience for everyone involved.

Fabric Committee

The fabric committee supports the PCC in maintaining our grade II* listed building in good condition, and where we can, improving our facilities.

The highlight of the year is – clearly – our much improved lighting in the nave and Langton Chapel. We are very pleased with the effects both practically and aesthetically. The new system will enable us to adjust the lighting flexibly for the very varied events in church. Our professional advisers and contractors have done an excellent job. And of course the Friends of St Mary's have made it all possible by their fund raising: all the money we have for our building projects is raised by them.

Less obviously, I hope, we have now installed the new CCTV system, to protect us against repeats of the incursions we have suffered in the past. We are carefully ensuring that data protection rules are followed.

By the time of the Annual Meeting it may well be that we have our new Langton Chapel window to commemorate the 800th anniversary of the reconsecration of the church in 2015.

We have installed a humidifier to help preserve the organ in good condition. It is neatly hidden in the cupboard in the Melvill Room. We also have a new fire alarm control system – the old one was knocked out by the huge storm last spring. And we continue to deal with the hundred and one minor jobs that any building like ours throws up, as well as the regular checks on the boilers, the fire safety equipment, the lightning conductor and so on.

I am as ever grateful to the members of the fabric committee who give their time and expertise to make these things happen: the Rector and churchwardens, Phil Bladen, David Coppinger, Patrick Findlater, Trisha Hawkins, William Heller, Michael Murison, and Sam Wright.

Faith In Action

One of the five priorities for St Mary's is Outreach. In response to the many blessings we receive we should be generous in serving the needs of people locally, nationally and internationally.

So we promote the work of a small number of charities in each category. Their work should challenge the way we see the world and our part in it. We give information about each organisation, and we encourage prayer, financial support and practical help for them.

One or other of our charities is always among the special prayers for the week and intercessors often include the current charity in our prayers. We are pleased that a number of people have told us that they find it helpful to see the information we offer about the charities in our pewsheet; and they welcome the visits to the church by representatives of the charities to talk about them.

We thank those in the congregation who have responded with practical help, including by cooking for those who attend homeless lunches, volunteering in local charities, offering food to the Foodbank, and fundraising through participation in events.

St Mary's is able to help our charities by donations. The money does not come from the PCC's budget for running costs; it comes from the Barnes Charity Ball, from half the proceeds of the Christmas Charity Fair, from the surplus made at the Fashion Show and from other events. And we give some gifts in kind, such as food donated at Harvest Festivals.

Over 2016 our charities were:

Castelnau Centre Project (community development in North Barnes): we gave £3000 from the Ball plus £1750 from the Fashion Show

Age UK Richmond's Barnes Green Centre (support for older people): £1226

FiSH (voluntary community care in our area): £1750 From the Fashion Show

Glass Door (accommodation, advice and support for the homeless): £1226

Richmond Welcare (support for families and children): £1820

Southwark diocesan link supporting the clergy in the diocese of Matabeleland in Zimbabwe: £1226

Christian Aid (international development): St Mary's congregation played the major role in the street collection in Barnes, which raised a total of £16,660

Under Tree Schools (education of girls in South Sudan): £8000 from the Ball plus £1760, including our young people's Advent fundraising

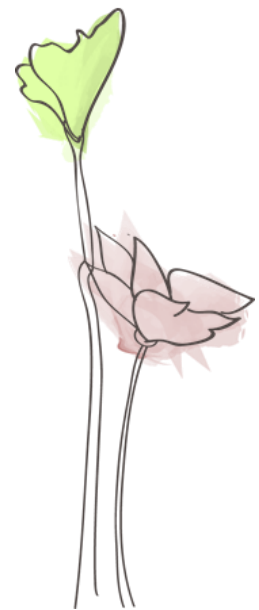
Christian Solidarity Worldwide (concern for oppressed religious minorities): £175 from the Saturday coffee shop.

The congregation also supported the Bishop's Lent Appeal with £1278 and the Children's Society with £219; the Carol Service raised £1650 for the Church Urban Fund; we staffed meals for the homeless; and those who run our Saturday coffee shops raise further funds for a wide range of charities.

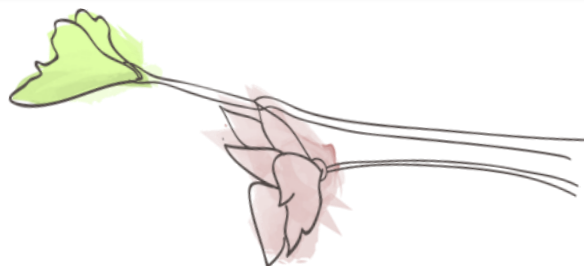
St Mary's Garden of Remembrance

The Friends of St Mary's Barnes raise funds for the upkeep and renovation of our historic church building and churchyard and promote awareness of its place in the life and history of Barnes. Having run many individual events over the twenty years

since the Friends were founded, our programme is now focussed on three major annual events: *Barnes Charity Ball* in February, *Barnes Music Festival* in March and *Barnes Charity Fashion Show* in October. These have now become established annual events which have raised considerable sums for St Mary's and for local, international and church charities and have established a strong presence for St Mary's within the Barnes community.

The *Barnes Charity Fashion Show* in October 2016 ran for two nights for the second year and was again successful with an audience of around 250 on each night. The shows were very well received, with a different programme of boutiques for each night introduced by Zac Goldsmith and Kate Silverton, and the total amount raised was over £10,000 which was shared between Castelnau Centre, FiSH, Activity Station and the Friends.

The *Barnes Charity Ball* in February 2017 with the theme *Carnival* combined the excitement of the carnival with gorgeous girls, samba, feathers, dancing and glittering costumes. Entertainment was from the Paradiso School of Samba, Viramundo and the Oi Brasil Samba Dancers with an open auction led by experienced auctioneer Jonny Gould. The event raised just over £50,000 for Under Tree Schools, Castelnau Centre, Glass Door Homeless, Children's Acute Transport Service and the Friends.

The *Barnes Music Festival* in March 2017 was the fifth festival and had as its theme *Music & Place* celebrating the way in which music enhances our appreciation of spaces and landscapes whether this is the countryside or the city, the sea or the sky, the world or just Barnes. The varied programme over two weeks had 29 events at 9 venues with an additional 5 Young Artists Soirées in private houses. New features including the launch of the Barnes Young Musician of the Year, music workshops in all

the local primary schools leading up to a performance of Dodgson's *The Boat Race* with 90 children, and the first-ever classical music concert at the London Wetland Centre. We experienced some outstanding performances from Tasmin Little and

Orpheus Sinfonia, Madeleine Mitchell, Nick Wearne, Ashley Fripp, Gyles Brandreth, Martin Neary, James Gilchrist, Craig Ogden, Kit & McConnel, Fulham Camerata, the English Chamber Choir, English Chamber Singers, the Barnes Choir, Barnes Community Choir, Cantabile, the Alke Quartet, The Rautio Piano Trio, Le Petit Orchestre, St Paul's School Jazz Band and the National Youth Jazz Orchestra. The closing Festival Choral Evensong brought together the combined choirs of St Michael's and St Mary's led by Martin Neary and a thought-provoking address by Bishop Michael Marshall. It was also an opportunity for us to say farewell to Artistic Director Daniel Turner who inspired the creation of the festival five years ago and has provided outstanding artistic direction. One of the aims of the Festival is to engender a spirit of community through music performance and appreciation and this was certainly achieved with a total audience of nearly 4000 and over 750 musicians taking part and significant funds raised for local and music charities.

Other events during the year included the Richard Harries & John Humphrys debate in October on the theme of Richard Harries' new book *The Beauty and The Horror*. This was a packed-out event with 300 people attending and vigorous questioning of Richard Harries by John Humphrys. The total raised for the Friends fund was nearly £3000. In November, we hosted the *Capability Landscapes* exhibition by the artist Alasdair Saunders and the launch event attracted 100 people to hear Alasdair talk about his exhibition. At the Friends Annual

Choral Evensong in October, the St Mary's Choir was on excellent form and the Bishop of Hereford, Rt Rev Richard Frith, gave a thought-provoking sermon.

All these events have not only encouraged greater awareness of St Mary's and brought many people into the church building but they have also raised significant funds both for the church and for nominated charities which have amounted to over half a million pounds over the twenty years. These funds have been used to pay for heating, lighting and sound systems, notice boards, paving and repairs to the tower and churchyard walls as well as the upgrade of the church rooms. The Friends Fund now also pays for all utility costs, maintenance, repairs and capital projects for St Mary's, the most significant of which this year have been the installation of a new lighting system and a new humidifier for the organ.

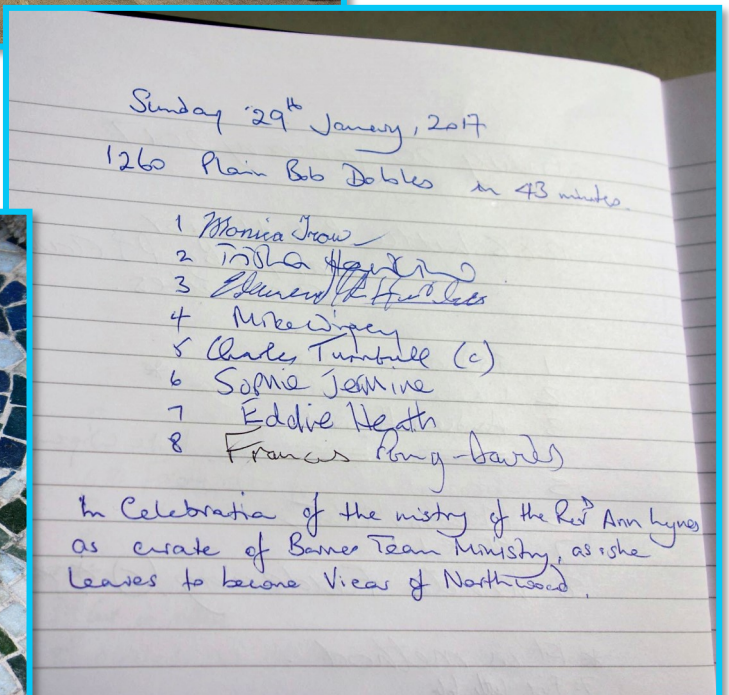

Kitson Hall

Hirings, community and church use

In terms of income we now have 3 substantial hirers, namely Clifford Dance Studios, Ark Nursery, and Pedal Project (cycle training for children). Clifford Dance Studios has now overtaken Ark Nursery as the biggest hirer of the hall. It is estimated these three hirers now produce approximately 50% of the annual income for the hall.

Backflip Performers ceased using the hall at Christmas as did two other smaller hirers. Puppy Training have served notice to terminate with effect from the Summer Term. The Barnes Summer Playscheme terminated their longstanding use of the hall

just before the Summer holidays last year. However, income received from short term hirings arranged at short notice over the Summer holidays exceeded the fee they would have paid.



The hall is always in high demand for children's parties at weekends but availability for wedding receptions has reduced due to greater use of the hall by Clifford Dance Studios and Pedal Project.

Barnes Community Players are reinstating their Summer show in 2017, in addition to their annual pre-Christmas show. They have recently turned out their storage cupboard (which was choc a bloc and a potential fire hazard) and they made a reasonable sum of money by selling some of the proceeds at a sale in the hall. Other community uses include the Barnes Community Association and Scouts jumble sales and homeless lunches.

The hall is well used by the church for St Mary's Minis Playgroup (a new initiative), Barnes Youth Group, major fundraising events such as the Charity Ball and Fashion Show, and various church receptions and meals.

Hall income and expenditure

In 2016 income was just under £60,000, compared with about £48,000 in 2015 and £45,000 in 2014. The increase in income was mainly due to Pedal Project, a new hirer, and much greater use of the hall by Clifford Dance Studios. A close eye is kept on current fee levels and there will be some increases in September this year.

Expenditure in 2016 was £43,900, compared with £30,600 in 2015.

Maintenance, repairs and improvements

This included new replacement boilers, repainting the frontage, new Kitson Hall sign, complete re-sanding and re-varnishing of all the timber flooring in both halls, lighting improvements and additional radiators in the small hall, new oven and dishwasher, and a considerable amount of electrical work (mainly stage lighting and external lighting) and removal of moss from the roof.

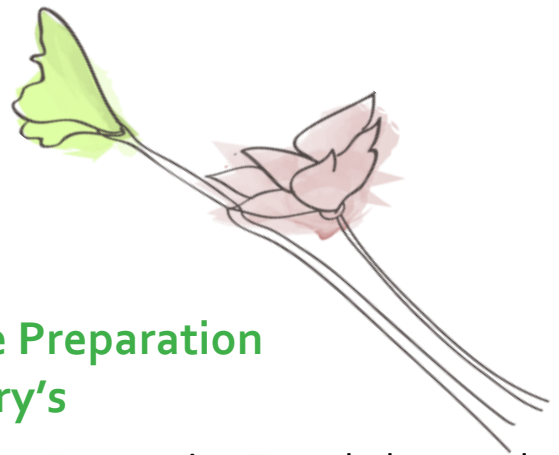
Kitson Hall (cont'd)

Summary

In spite of recent cancellations by some hirers, the hall is being increasingly heavily used. Though parking facilities are poor, it is one of the largest internal spaces in the locality and some hirers have noted the improved standards of maintenance. A balance has to be maintained between hiring out the hall commercially and use by church and community. If hirers are excluded too frequently there is a risk they will look elsewhere. It is hoped that the recent substantial increase in hall income will at least be maintained in 2017. Expenditure for 2017 is budgeted at £42,000 but it is anticipated this will reduce somewhat over the next few years now that the boiler and oven have both been replaced.

Marriage Preparation at St Mary's

Music at St Mary's

Music is an important part of our worship at St Mary's and the senior choir supports the singing at the 10.00 Eucharist on most Sundays of the year (with short breaks after Christmas and Easter, and a summer break). Each week an anthem appropriate to the theme of the service is sung. The choir also sings in the worship on special occasions such as Ash Wednesday, The Friends Annual Evensong, the final event of The Barnes Music Festival, Christmas Carol service and other Choral Evensong services.



We are delighted by the progress of the Junior Choir, who join in some of these services. Their singing is a joy for all concerned – whether singing or listening.

We have been most fortunate to have benefited from the skills in music making and choir training of Dan Turner, who has now left us after almost six years as our Director of Music. The search is on for the right person to take over the role.

St Mary's offers a choral scholarship for each voice-part to 6th formers, as well as an organ scholarship. In addition, Emily Cooper is our senior choral scholar and is a great asset. Hugo Williams, our organ scholar, is developing by leaps and bounds into a very capable organist, as well as an excellent pianist. Sadly our tenor scholar, Gareth Smith, left us at Christmas and we are seeking to replace him as well as recruiting an alto and bass scholar. Since the scheme was introduced at St Mary's, a number of other local churches have adopted similar programmes, making it more difficult for us to attract scholars.

Christabel Gairdner's piano playing during communion from time to time continues to enhance our worship. We are very lucky to have her amongst us.

The Barnes Music Festival continues to grow and has just staged the 5th annual festival, with two weeks of music being performed in nine different venues throughout Barnes. The mix of music and performers means there is something for everyone. Many local people have taken part in choirs or bands, as well as established and budding professionals. Andrew Summers and Dan Turner are heartily congratulated on another successful event, which not only introduced lots of people to different musical styles but also brought many new people into St Mary's.

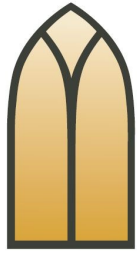
